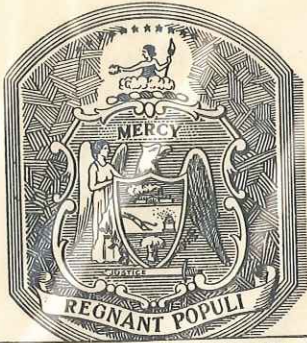
## Oregon Centennial

The Oregon Centennial stamp was issued to commemorate the one hundredth anniversary of the settling of the Whitman and Spaulding families in the Oregon Country.

Dr. Marcus Whitman, his wife Narcissus, the Rev. Henry Harmon Spaulding and his wife Eliza were residents of New York State who, in 1836 left their homes and, after a rigorous, five-months overland journey, settled in the west. The Whitmans settled at Waiilatpu, near the present site of Walla Walla; the Spauldings at the confluence of the Snake and Clearwater Rivers, the present site of Lewiston, Idaho. These were the first permanent settlements in the vast territory that now comprises the States of Washington, Oregon, Idaho and parts of Montana and Wyoming.

**Arkansas Centennial**

The territory that now comprises the State of Arkansas was first visited by the Spanish explorer De Soto. In 1673 the French under Pierre Marquette and Joliet named the area Arkansas after the Indians of that tribe who had a settlement near the mouth of the Arkansas River.

The first white settlement was founded by De Tonti at Arkansas Post in 1686. The territory was acquired from France as a part of the Louisiana Purchase in 1803. It became a part of Missouri in 1812 and was organized as Arkansas Territory in 1819. Arkansas was admitted to the Union as a slave state on June 19, 1836.

The commemorative stamp affixed to this cover was issued in connection with the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the Statehood of Arkansas. First-day sale date and post office as shown by the cancellation.

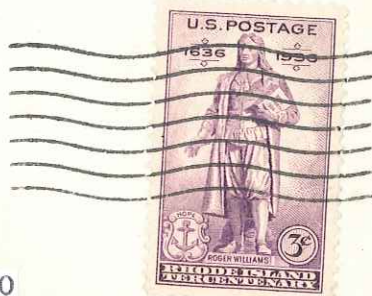


### Rhode Island Tercentenary

Among these who fled, Roger Williams was perhaps the most prominent. Because of his views on separation of church he was ordered from the Colony in October, 1633. He spent the following winter with the Indian chief, Massasoit. The Spring of 1636 witnessed the building of his home at Seekonk (East Providence). With William Harris and others he laid the foundations of Providence in the following days. The Colony was officially named Rhode Island by the Royal Charter of Charles II granted July 8, 1653.

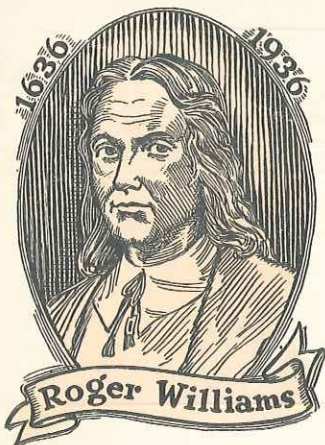

### Virginia Dare Commemorative Stamp

The stamp affixed hereto was issued to commemorate the 350th anniversary of the birth of Virginia Dare, the first white child born in the New World. She was born Aug. 18, 1587 on Roanoke Island, 20 miles north of Cape Hatteras, within the present limits of North Carolina. Her parents, Anthonie and Eleanor Dare were members of an ill-fated colonizing party of 121 souls who attempted, in the summer of 1587, to found a colony on Roanoke Island under the guidance of Raleigh. Four years after her birth the settlement was found in ruins, the colonists massacred or dispersed among the Indian tribes. Present-day half-breeds of Robeson Co., N.C. claim to be descendants of Virginia Dare and others of the first colonists of Roanoke Island. The Virginia Dare Stamp was first placed on sale at Monticello, Roanoke Island, N.C. on August 18, 1937.
