

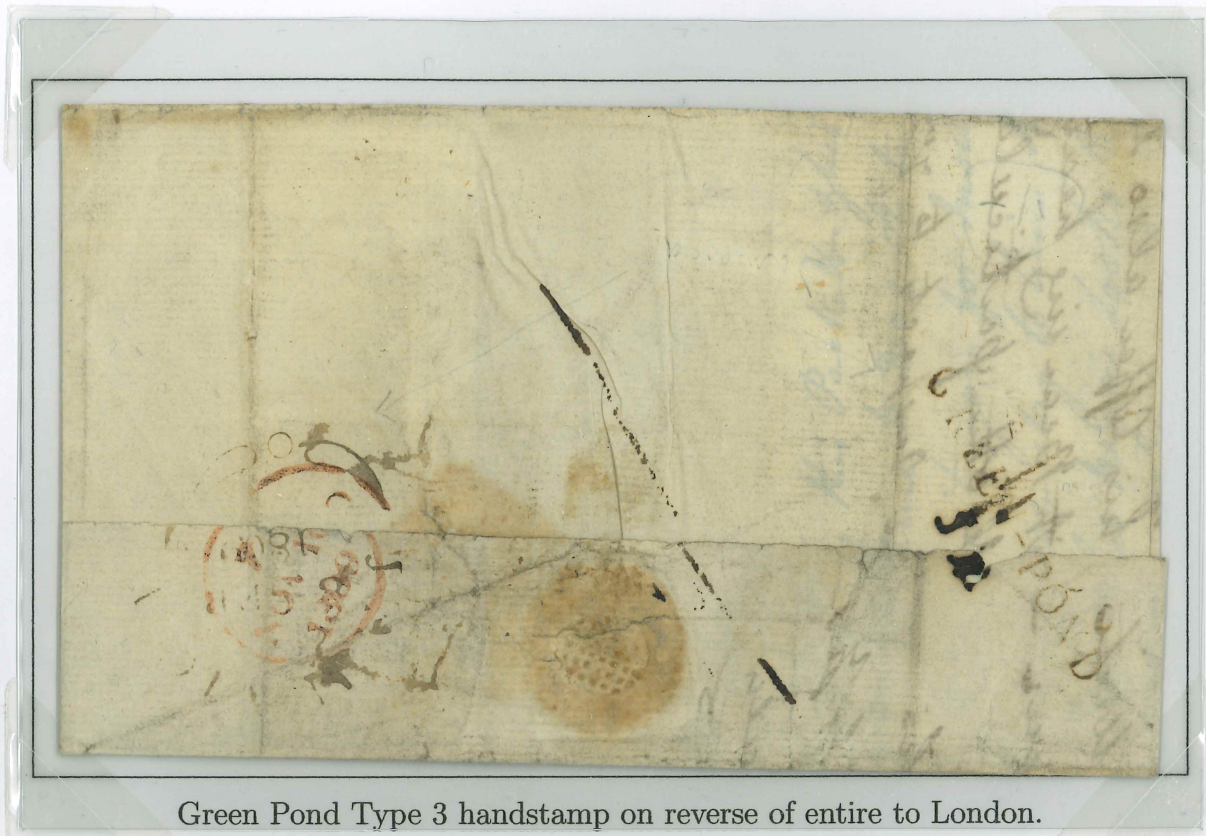

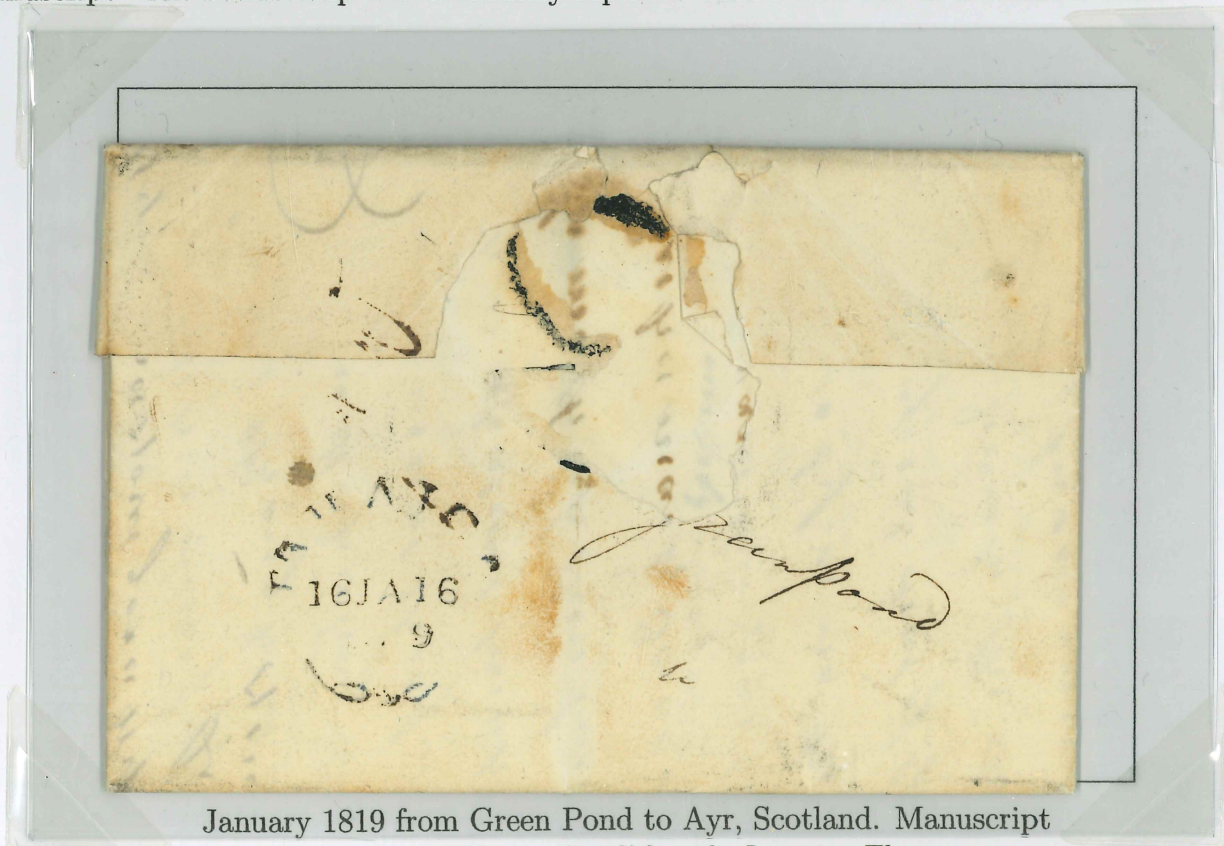

Lost handstamp at Green Pond P.O.



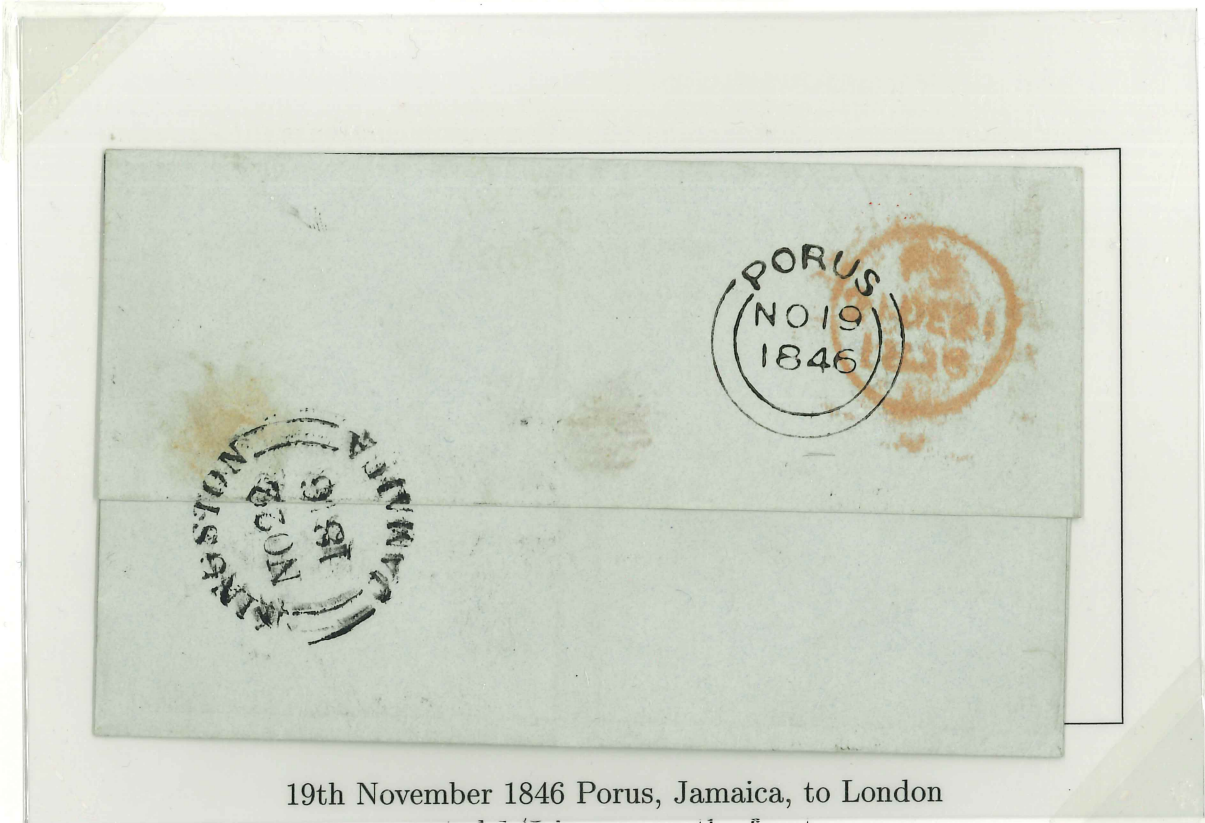
Green Pond Type 3 handstamp on reverse of entire to London.
September 1809, charged 2/- Packet Rate.

Lost handstamp The original Green Pond Type 3 handstamp was misplaced in 1819. The origin of mail had to be shown for accounting purposes, and so the postmaster endorsed mail in manuscript. The handstamp was eventually replaced with a new one in December 1820.

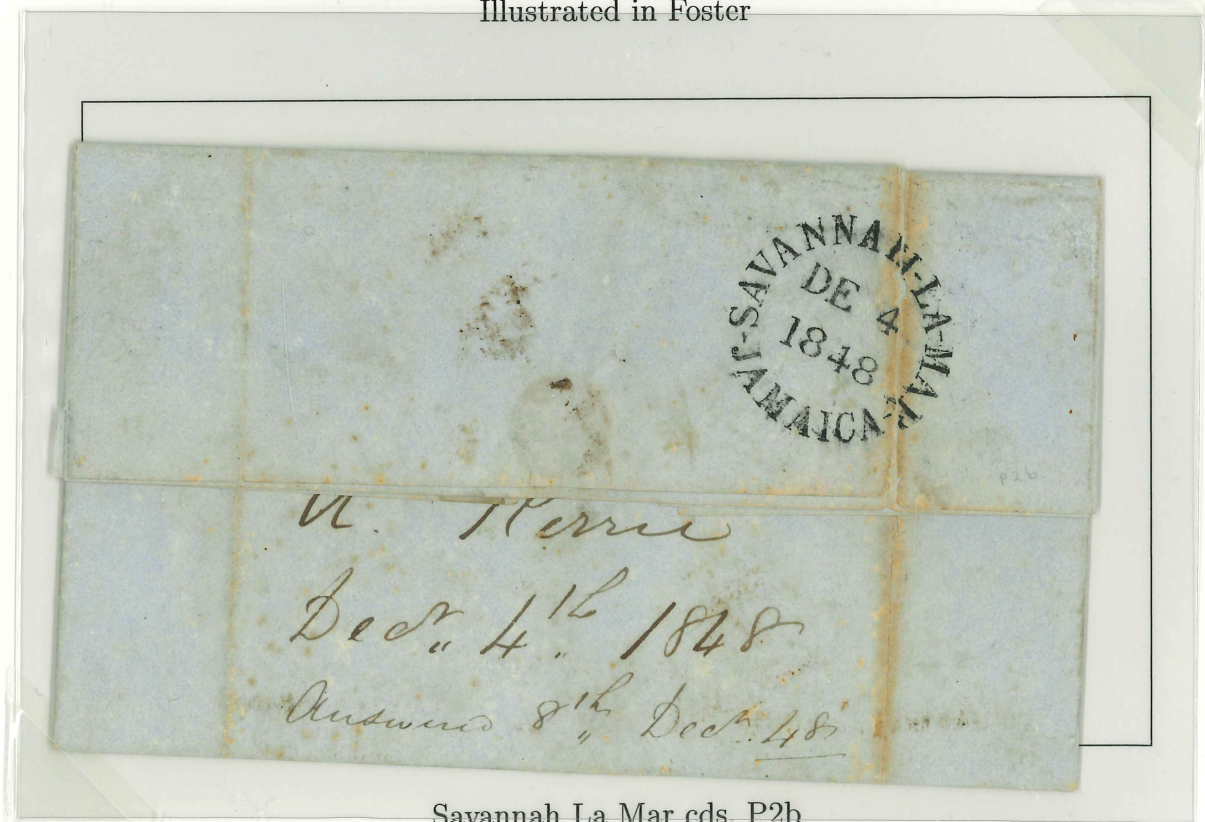


January 1819 from Green Pond to Ayr, Scotland. Manuscript

Post Town Straight line handstamps, Type T4



10th July 1837 Port Antonio to Kingston
Port Antonio straight line mark, Type T4a
"Post" in black m.s.

From Alex Brymer, Vice Consul for Spain at Port Antonio,
to the Vice Consul for Spain at Kingston.

When the colonial government assumed responsibility for the Jamaica Post Office in
1860, Alex Brymer became its first Postmaster.

Post Town Straight line handstamps, Type T3



7th January 1812, Falmouth to London
Addressed "Opposite Bancrofts Alms House, Mile End Road"
Falmouth JA straight line mark
Jamaica fleuron, applied at Kingston, dated 10th January



October 11th 1808 Montego Bay to North Frederick Street, Edinburgh
Montego Bay JA straight line mark
