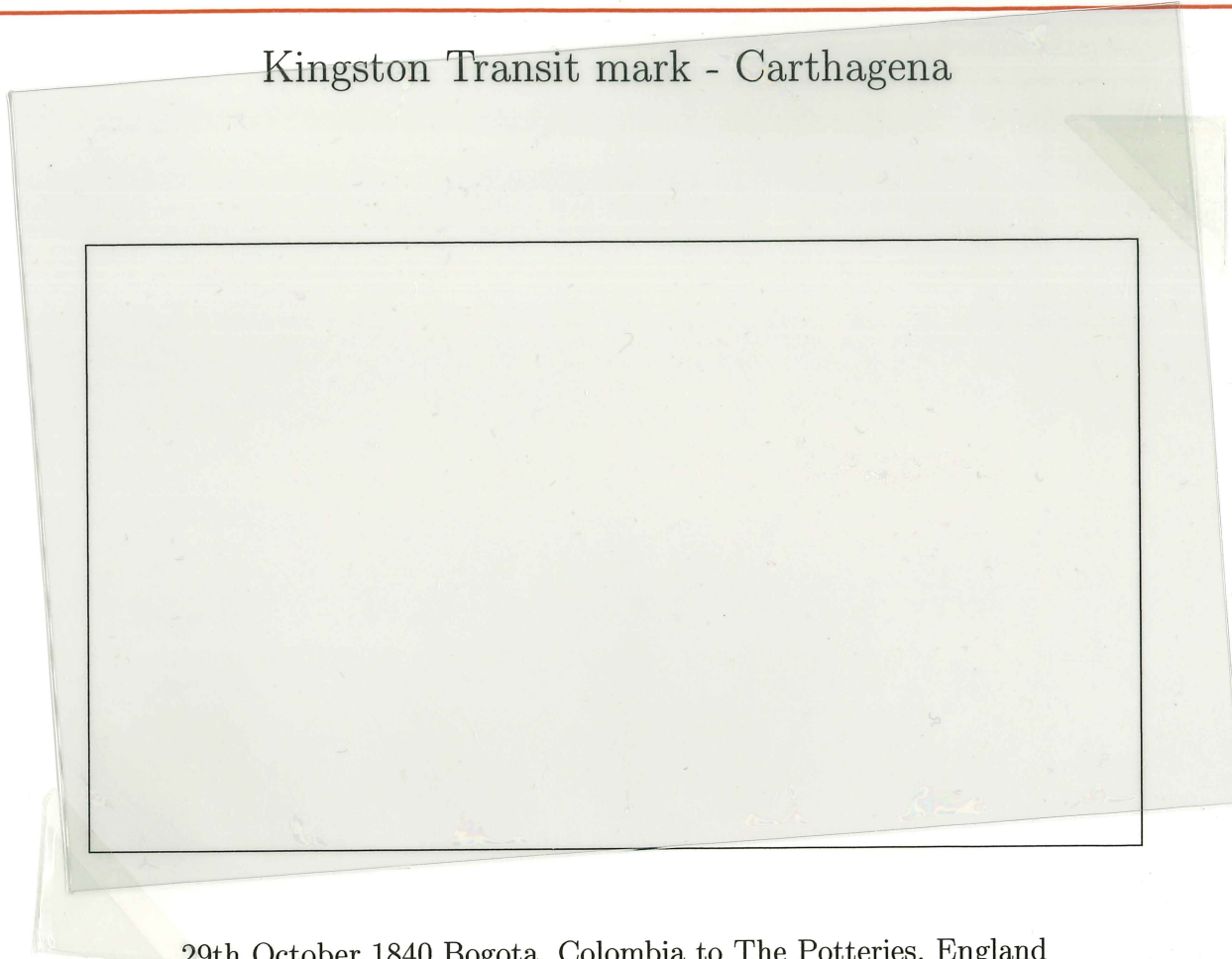


Kingston Transit mark - Carthagen



29th October 1840 Bogota, Colombia to The Potteries, England
Oval "Bogota / Franca" and handstamped "3" in red
"Carthagen" fleuron transit in red. Rated 2/3 in black ms.

Contains account of a rebellion.
On the reverse, Kingston K2 datestamp December 4th

St Ann's Bay Ship Letter handstamp



Fragile cross-written letter from the USA to Mr Francis Holland, Mandeville, Jamaica. Salem NC circular handstamp in blue, top left 'PAID' in blue top right. Rare "Saint Ann's Bay / Ship Letter" handstamp on the front. Rated 1s in manuscript, for inland postage.

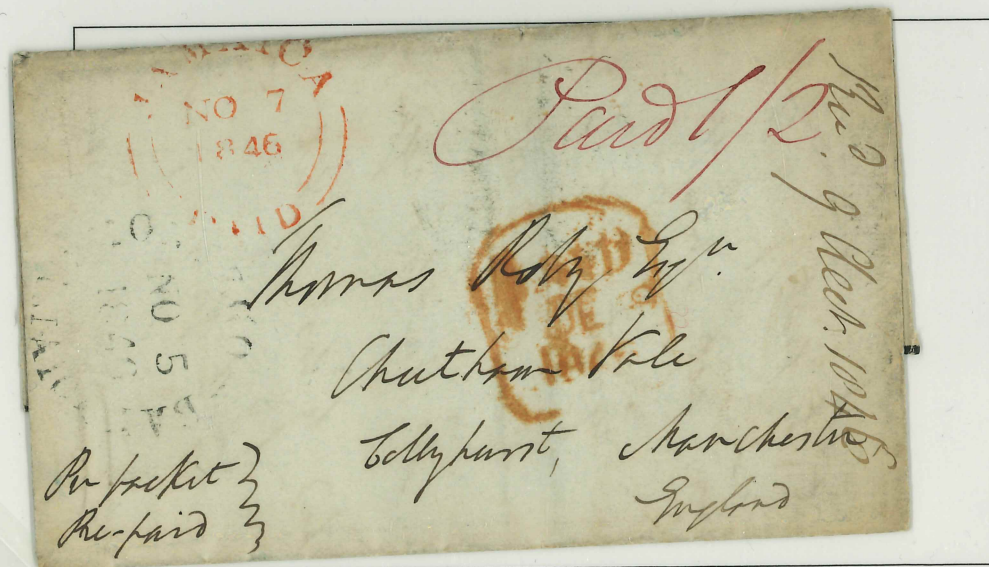

20th January 1847, Montego Bay, Jamaica, to Madeira
 Montego Bay circular datestamp, Foster P2b
 Jamaica Paid PD5 in red dated 22nd January
 "Paid 3s" in red ms, crossed out in England
 Charged 160 (to pay in Madeira)



5th November 1846 Montego Bay circular datestamp P2b
 Jamaica Paid PD5 in red applied at Kingston 7th November
 Manchester receiver 9th December on reverse.

"Paid 1/2" rating in ms.
 From 1843 an 'all in' packet rate of 1s 2d included inland postage
 in both Jamaica and Great Britain.

Steam Packet



8th August 1854, Bath to Aberdeen.

Rated 6d in black ms.

Packet letter rate was reduced to 6d single from March 1854.

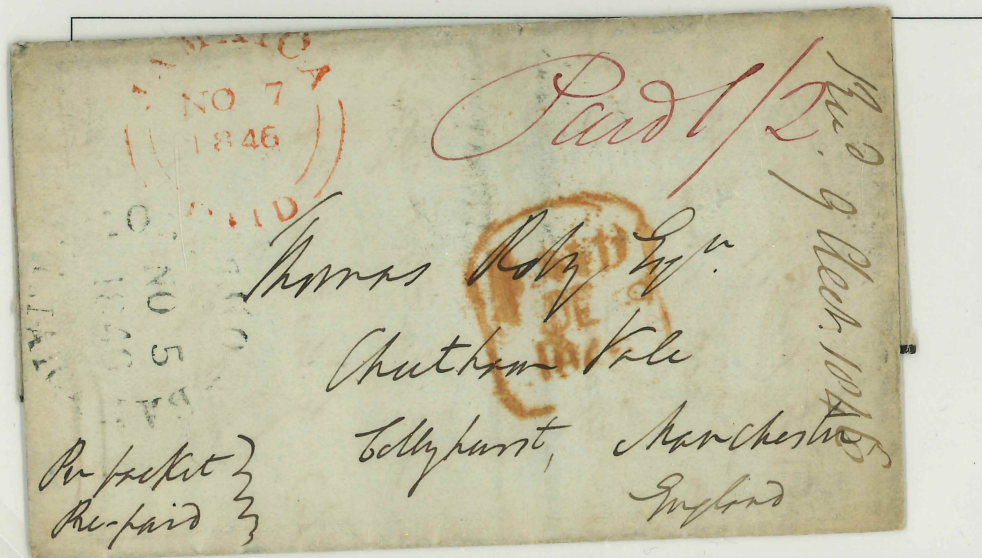
On the reverse, Bath P2a datestamp.

Notepaper with small embossed oval imprint "Geo Henderson & Co., Kingston".

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1800 Cape Francois, Saint Domingue to Newburyport, Massachusetts



Letter dated 16th January 1800. Ms 12 (twelve cents?) on outer.

The writer, Sewell Toppans, an American trader, explains that it has taken him longer than expected to sell his goods, and gives the prices obtained in the local market.

This is the third letter he has sent to his correspondent, who appears to be his patron, but he repeats how long the journey out had taken, 25 days, and explains that he

"could not have left this Port until yesterday unless I had gone without a passport from the Consul General which would have been in dire=ct violation to your orders".

Saint Domingue was the western portion of Hispaniola under French control, ceded to France by Spain in 1697.

The French Revolution gave impetus to a slave rebellion in the 1790s.

By 1800 Toussaint L'Ouverture held the office of Governor General, and slavery was abolished.

Following independence, the name Haiti was adopted in 1804.

Pre-paid letter from London to Newcastle, Jamaica



1st November 1843, London to Newcastle, Jamaica

Dent, Watch maker, 82 Strand, acknowledging receipt of a note and bank draft sent on 17th September.

Lt. Col. Godfrey Rhodes embarked on 30th December 1841 with 10 officers and 300 men, under the command of Lt. Col. Charles Markham. The 60th (Royal Rifles) were the first British troops to occupy the hill station at Newcastle.

Moved to Quebec March 1844.

Envelope contains letter on notepaper with attractive pre-printed trade mark.
