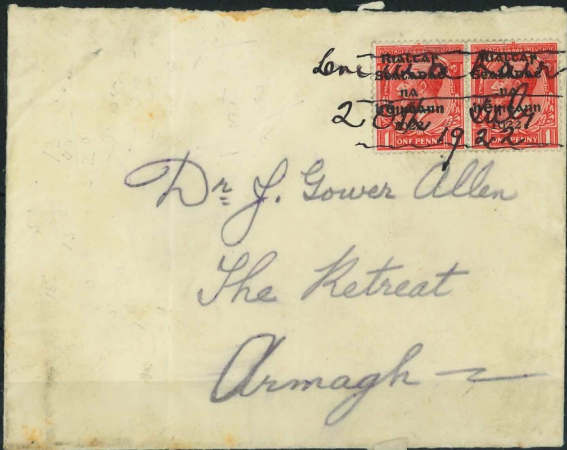

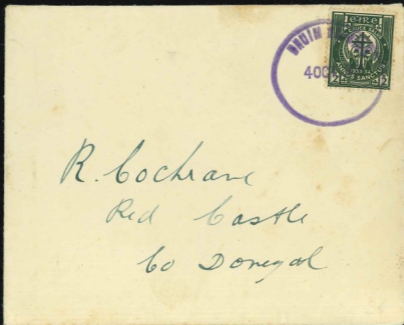
This handstamp, which has had 'Strabane, Co Tyrone' removed from the foot remains in use in 1937

1922 cover to Armagh franked. 1d. pair with ms. "Dromahair/20th July/1922" ms. cancellation with S.L. & N.C. 4d. railway stamp on reverse.

Sent from the Sligo area during the Civil War period of disruption to postal services, the envelope taken across the border and sent by train from Drohamair to Armagh.

Waterford did not have a cancelling machine until February 1923 so it was always in Irish

TRANSITION PERIOD

Change of language.

Machine A - "Dublin" to 12th May - "B.A.C." from 13th May, 1922

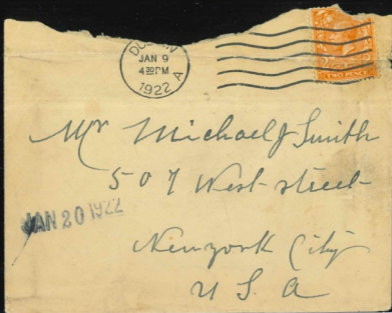


British postal stationery was not overprinted and remained on sale and valid from 1st April 1922 until Irish replacements were issued.
 Postcard - Dublin to USA 6th February 1923 with 'LEARN IRISH' cancel



Consequences of Transition

Dec 1922 envelope to Dublin with ½d green with overprint plus ½d green with no overprint, both tied with emergency Krag machine cancel.
 The unoverprinted stamp was no longer valid however the rate for printed papers (first ounce) was reduced to ½d on Nov 1st 1922.



The Treaty was signed on 6 December, 1921 but overprinted stamps were not issued until 17 February, 1922. During the intervening period British stamps **had** to be used.



Consequences of Transition

Invalid use of un-overprinted stamp

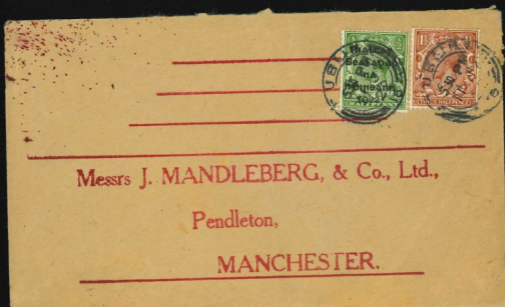
Undated envelope to Dublin with GB 2d orange not allowed for postage so marked '4d to Pay' but no other markings (so likely not collected)



Transition Period

Overprints used in England after the valid period.

After issue on 17th Feb 1922 the overprints were valid for use in The British Isles until the end of March. This cover appears to be 'cut-down' (no registration label) so there may have been postage due marks or labels present.



Consequences of Transition

(Invalid use of GB stamps accepted in Ireland)

Dublin to Manchester 11th July 1922

A postage due charge should have been raised by The Irish Post Office in respect of the un-overprinted British 1 1/2d stamp.

GP DUES STILL IN USE

April 3rd, 1922 - Post Unpaid - Double Deficiency Charged.

Postcard sent unfranked from Ivybridge with '3d/TO PAY/408' with 3 x GB 1d red dues.

One tied by Killiney cancel and the other two tied by Dublin cancels



IRISH POSTAL DUES

1926 sent unfranked from Manchester to Dublin with '3d/TO PAY/498' paid with 1d red & 2d green Irish Dues.

Interestingly the Postage due is charged at twice the GB letter rate.

1927 ½d green wrapper used Dublin to Switzerland



WWII Two censor covers from India to Ireland incl 8a cancelled large X in black and C15 chargemark with red bilingual RELEASED BY CENSOR boxed h/s, other bearing 9p pair and 1a red pair tied B cancels and PASSED NAVAL CENSOR in violet, English EXAMINER 4936 sealing label and green bilingual RELEASED BY CENSOR boxed h/s, intr duo.

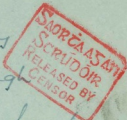
