IS IT INSURRECTION ?

ALLEGED GENERAL "RISING" IN IRELAND.

The Irish Volunteers WILD RUMOURS FROM DUBLIN.

REPORTED SEIZURE OF GOVERNMENT OFFICES.

GALWAY ISOLATED.

POSTAL AND TELEGRAPHIC COMMUNICATION CUT OFF AND RAILWAY LINE TORN UP.

Strange Scenes in Galway Yesterday.

Galway, Tuesday.
From an early hour on Monday (yesterday) morning the news of strange, serious and portentous happenings in Dublin, indicative of a "Rising" or rebellion on the part of the Irish Volunteers, which recalled '67, but more especially '98, spread through Galway. Whispers were carried from mouth to mouth, and a growing excitement became a general ferment as the day grew. The fact that there was positively no definite information to go on gave scope for the wildest individual conjectures as to the nature and magnitude of these national events; and as far as the scale, purpose and issue of the insurrection are concerned we are in the dark even at the moment of writing. Rumour having nothing tangible to go upon, turned upon itself and thrived on what it fed upon. Each person took up a tale from somebody else, and before passing it on gave it his own idiosyncratic twist. But after making allowance for the most prolific invention, two facts emerge:—(1) That the nature of the turmoil is very grave not only as affects the present political administration of this country and its future destiny, but as regards not, indeed its military, but moral effect on the Allied cause; and (2) the remarkable composure and recollection of the citizens as a body. A brief recapitulation of what for the nonce must stand for ascertainable facts will serve as an introduction and an explanation of what took place in Galway and the environments during the course of the day.

AN IRISH ARMY?

Rather late on Monday night the report became pretty general, though it was not in the possession of all, that the Sinn Fein party who, for the purposes of this memoir, as well as from the military point of view, may be denoted as the Irish Volunteers had shot a long anticipated bolt. It was asserted that on the previous day the following Government buildings in Dublin had been seized and held:—Dublin Castle, the Custom House, the Bank of Ireland and the General Post Office. Rumour had it that the latter Padian struc-

ture and other reports, no better founded, we can take no responsibility. As the day wore a sense of impending evil seemed to deepen, and clouds of anticipation to gather from whence exactly no one could say, and where to break no one could surmise. The vapours were pierced by a few tangibilities that brought the reality of the crisis home to the people. For instance the Post Office refused to accept wires not only to Dublin, but to any where else; it became definitely known that railway communication even between here and Athlery had been ruptured; and finally at about 2.30 it was rumoured that Athlery and Oranmore had been "taken," that a force of 600 men were marching on Galway, and that an engagement in the environment of Carnmore might be expected at about 5 o'clock. As a fact, however, Oranmore was never really taken.

AWAITING THE ATTACK.

A new phase was now reached. Men were no longer able to concentrate their minds on their business, and all and sundry fairly took to the streets. Comfortable merchants went about, and the streets were filled. About an hour later the following typewritten notice was displayed on one of the windows of the Post Office:—"I Francis William Hannon, Commander of the Royal Navy, being a competent military authority, do hereby direct that under Article 10 of the Defence of the Realm Act, 1914, Consolidation, all licensed premises in the Urban district of Galway are to be closed forthwith. I further direct that under Article 13 of the aforesaid Regulation all persons within the Urban District of Galway are to remain indoors from the hour of 5 p.m. to-day, 25th April, until 8 a.m. on the 26th April. Members of the National Volunteer Force are not included in this order." Straight away shutters were seen to be going up, and other premises commenced to close of their own accord, so that the town presented the appearance of a city preparing for an investment. Preparations were made for meeting and repelling the invasion, and anxious people found them-

Volunteers having donned their uniforms, and been provided with rifles with fixed bayonets, paraded the town until about 10 o'clock, when all likelihood of a scrap seemed to be "off."
A muggy day closed with a dry atmosphere and a serene sky. A burning desire, generally felt, to know precisely what was happening in Dublin was not satisfied, and the irony of the consideration was the reflection that in all probability the people of New York and New Zealand, as well as the citizens of European capitals were in all probability reading a detailed account of what occurred—was occurring there. In it all one had the sense—the vague sense—that one was living through a historic hour, that for a day the town was recalling the stirring days of Emmett and Lord Edward, and the men of '67, with this taking of police barracks, those conjectural "risings" and marchings, and with the same dependence on primitive methods, the despatch rider and rumour which characterised the happenings of those times, as if we were not living in the days of motor, telephone and telegraph.

Incidents at Oranmore

POLICE BARRACKS RUSHED AND STATION SIGNALS BROKEN.

SHOTS EXCHANGED

BETWEEN FORCES OF THE CROWN AND THE VOLUNTEERS.

A "Prisoner's" Escape.

Galway, Wednesday.
The most exciting incidents of the day, so far as can be learned in the City, occurred in the vicinity of Oranmore. Early yesterday morning four armed men entered the signal cabin, and whilst they had the signalman "covered" with their revolvers, one of their number took a shovel and broke the signals. At the moment Mr. Courtenay, superintendent of the line, was endeavouring to get into communication from Athlery with the Oranmore signal cabin. The armed men, whom the signalman, a newcomer to the district, did not recognise, left after putting the signals out of commission.

Subsequently, as the two o'clock train, which had only established a connection as far as Mullingar, was covering the distance between Athlery and Galway, a sharp look-out was kept. Mr. Courtenay travelling on the train. But for the effective vigilance of those on the engine a disaster would undoubtedly have occurred, as a short section of the rails had been removed in the region of Derrydonnell. The incoming train, which was travelling at 40 miles an hour, was brought to a standstill just in time. Mr. Courtenay, and some of the passengers, immediately left the train and set out on foot for Galway, walking along the line. Upon arrival, Mr. Courtenay procured a pilot engine and a breakdown gang, and, speeding back to the scene, quickly had the line repaired, and returned with the train that had been temporarily held up.

Meanwhile things began to assume a sinister and ugly aspect in the village itself. Early in the day a force of Volunteers estimated at about 100 strong had marched towards the village. There were at the police barracks at the time Constables Smith, Foley, Barrett and Hefteran. Sergeant Healy and another con-

stant, County Inspector Rutledge, drew his revolver, and walked in front of the men, who then took the street at the double. A shot from the County Inspector's revolver was the signal to the men who opened fire as they ran. The whole episode, which appears to have been over in less time than it takes to write it. The Volunteers disappeared in masses and confusion, which they had apparently commanded. By the time the soldiers and police had reached the turn of the road, not one of them was to be seen, and no one remained save a group of people further down the street who had been silent spectators of the unusual scene. These were interrogated by the County Inspector, who then returned to the barracks and discovered all well there. The street fight which began about seven o'clock, was over within five minutes, although some of the firing party had emptied their magazines. The soldiers affirm that two men were seen to fall of the opposite side, but there is no confirmation of this.

During the firing a bullet whizzed past County Inspector Rutledge's ear, but neither he nor any member of his party was hit.

Constable MacDermott, who was out on patrol, had apparently fallen into the hands of the Volunteers as a captive, for he did not return up to the time the detachment returned.

Taking with him all the men at Oranmore and leaving nothing of value at the barracks, the County Inspector returned to Galway by the railway line. Before the men had gone far, the special train started and picked them up, and they arrived back in the City soon after nine o'clock.

Earlier in the evening Lieut.-Commander Edmunds, of the R.N.R., Commander Hannon, and a party of three special constables motored to Oranmore, and, upon returning, reported "All well."

Bloody Work!

BATTLE AT DAWN THIS MORNING AT CARNMORE.

Constable Whelan, Eglinton Street, Killed

Galway, Wednesday

Between 5 and 5.30 this (Wednesday) morning, about six or seven motor cars left Galway for the affected portion of the county for the purpose of seeing how the ground lay; what the fate had been of outlying barracks which might have been invested during the night; for quelling the insurrection; and for making arrests.

All went well until the party reached the cross-roads at Carnmore, where the most serious encounter of the local crisis occurred. Carnmore is about midway between Galway and Athlery.

At about 5.15 a motor car, driven by Constable Whelan, of Eglinton Street, Galway, was proceeding towards Athlery. It was accompanied by a party of Volunteers. The car was stopped by a force of Volunteers, and Constable Whelan was killed. The car was then conveyed to the City in the motor on which it was brought.

New Great Britain Air Letter Form July 1st. 1968

A new Air Letter form - different in shape & design, was issued on July 1st. It replaces the present one which had remained unaltered in shape & make-up since 1944. The price remains unaltered at 9d. There is a new stamp in light blue, dark blue & white, designed by David Gentleman and incorporating the head of the Queen by Arnold Machin, used on commemorative stamps. The stamp depicts a modern British aircraft - the VC10. The old stamp design, showing the Palace of Westminster was introduced in 1957. The new form has two vertical phosphor lines to the left of the unprinted stamp, coarse-grain PVA gum is used on the flaps. The same light blue in colour, the new form will be sold pre-folded in three, with three larger flaps which will enable it to be completely sealed. The old form, which was sold unfolded, has only two flaps, which left one end open, when folded, the new form measures 15cm. by 10.7cm., - the international maximum. With these changes the form will be fully suitable for treatment in our mechanised sorting offices.

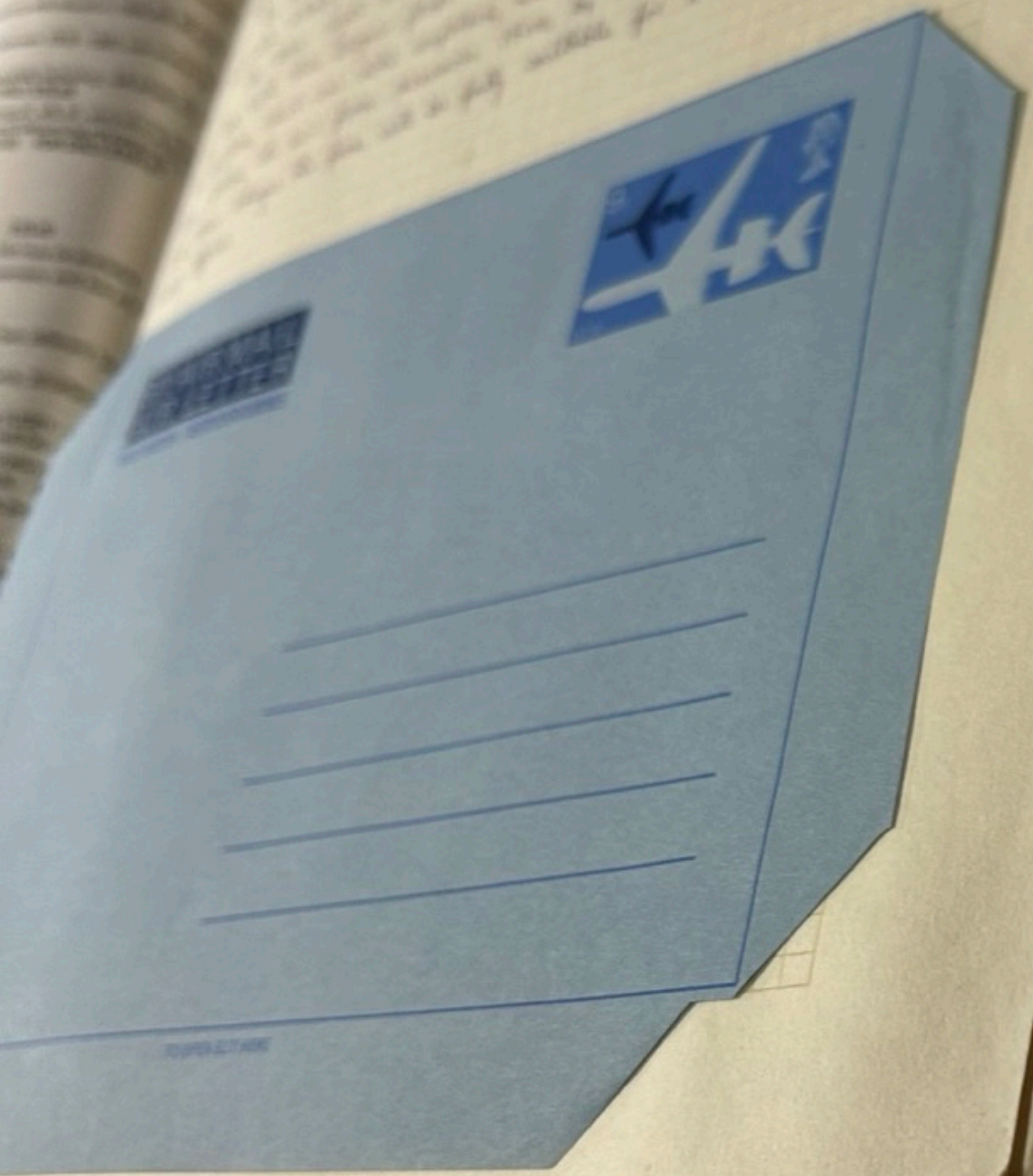
