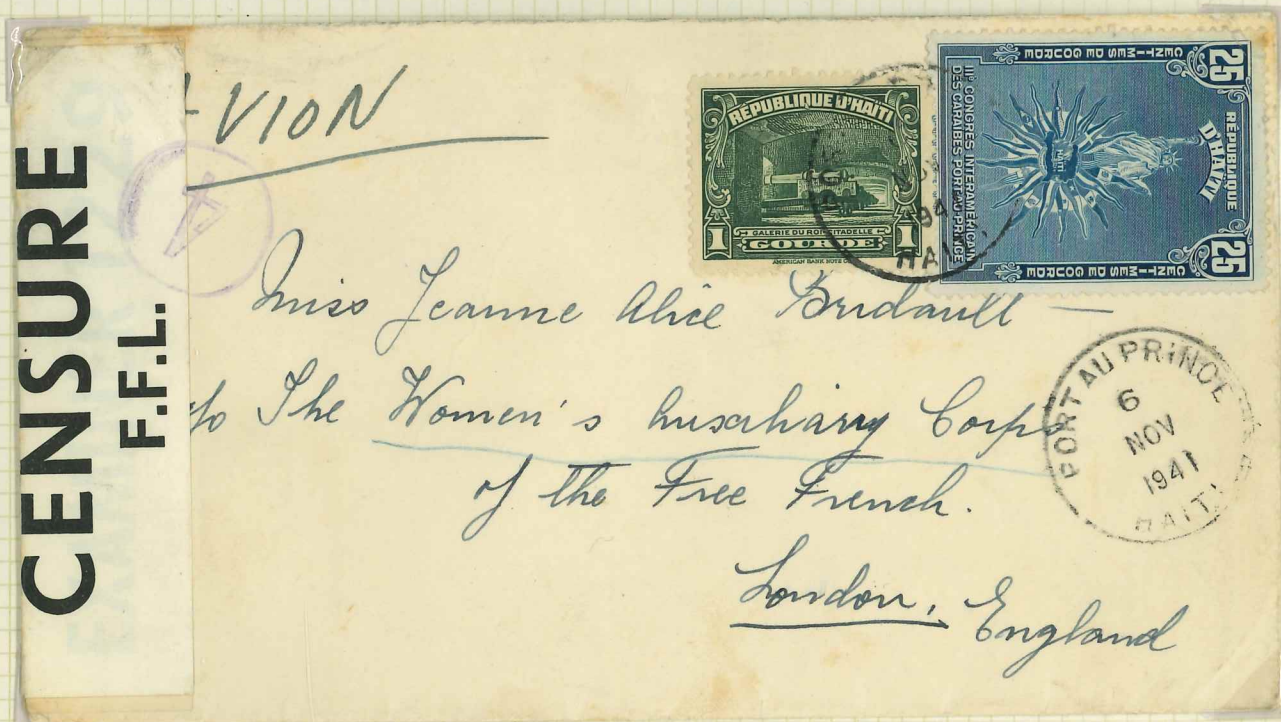


Haiti

CENSORED MAIL.

AIRMAIL to England, postage 1g 25c. Stamps cancelled with single ring (20mm diam) c.d.s. of Port-au-Prince 6 Nov 1941.

Not censored in Haiti - not then at war - but checked on arrival and resealed by Examiner 1229. Again opened and resealed by the Free French censor (Number 4) whose label covers the British one.

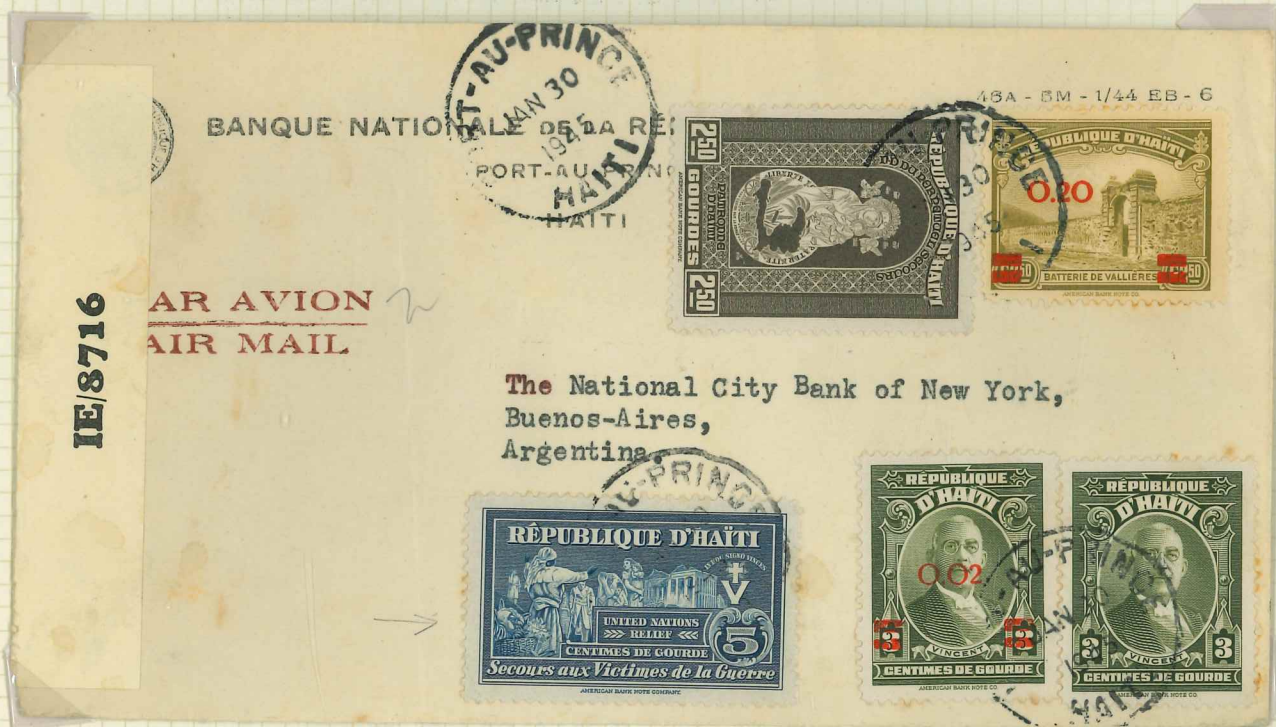

WARTIME CENSORSHIP: 1945.

TRINIDAD.

Postal Censorship in Trinidad included the examination of mail passing through the island from one foreign country to another - "intercepted mail." This cover to Argentina was not censored on leaving Haiti. It has been resealed after examination in Trinidad with the PC90 label (Roses type TR6) with the IE number 8716. This label is rarely found on intercepted mail and this number has not been noted elsewhere in use with this type of label.

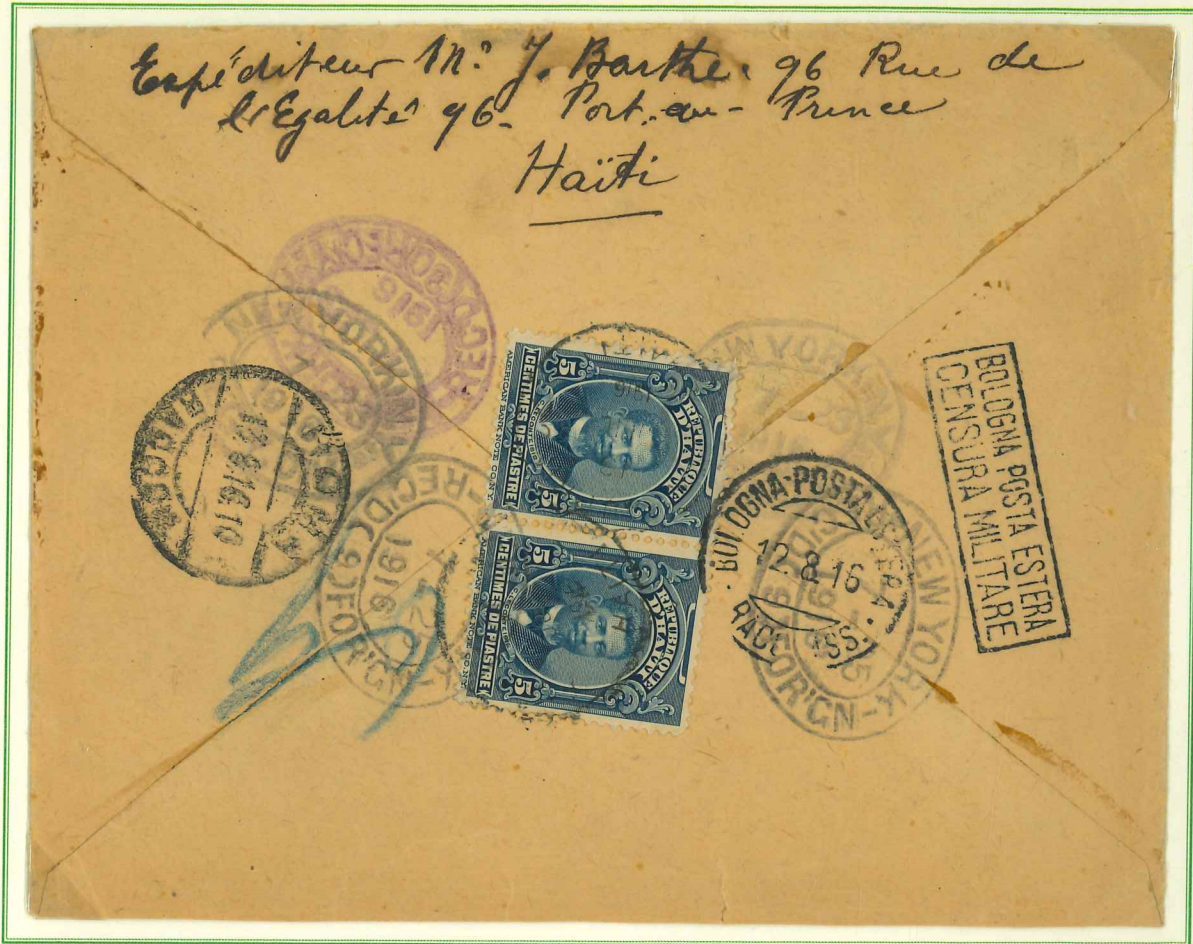


Postage 2g 75c with additional 5c obligatory tax in aid of U.N. Relief. Cancelled in Port-au-Prince on 30th January 1945.

HAITI

CENSORED MAIL

Registered mail to Rome in Italy, not censored in neutral Haiti, but censored on arrival at Bologna. The envelope was probably not open and resealed because was addressed to the Ministry of the Navy.



13 June 1916, from Port au Prince to Rome, Italy, in transit at New York. The envelope showing at the back boxed handstamp with the wording 'BOLOGNA POSTA ESTERA / CENSURA MILITARE'.

CENSORED MAIL: 1918.

Registered Mail to England in 1918. Not censored in neutral Haiti but on arrival in England, possibly at Liverpool on 4th September when the envelope was resealed on the left with the label of the British censor and backstamped.

Double ring (22 mm dia) c.d.s. of Cayes dated 6 August 1918, Registered 'R' in seven sided box and manuscript registration number. Also backstamped New York.

CENSORED MAIL

SURFACE MAIL to England, postage 25c, dated 28 Oct 1940.

Not censored in neutral Haiti, but only on arrival. Resealed with PC90 label of Examiner 366, the British censor.



Double ring (22mm diam.) c.d.s. of Port-au-Prince with bilingual slogan to cancel the stamp.

WARTIME CENSORSHIP: 1942

AIRMAIL to England. Postage paid by stamps of various issues totalling 2g 45c and cancelled at Port-au-Prince 8 June 1942. Transit at Lisbon on 24 July and readdressed in England on 10 September. Not very quick and reflects the low priority given to private mail on aircraft in war.

HAITI had Declared War on Japan on 8 December 1941 and on Germany and Italy on the 12th. This led to the introduction of Postal Censorship. This letter has the Haitian Censor's label on the left and tied on the back with an official cachet in magenta. British PC.90 label on right.

AIRMAIL

WARTIME CENSORSHIP.

Airmail to U.S.A. paid at 60c rate and cancelled at Port-au-Prince on 4 July 1942. Also has large "Aeroplane and VIA AIR MAIL" CACHET. No arrival markings.

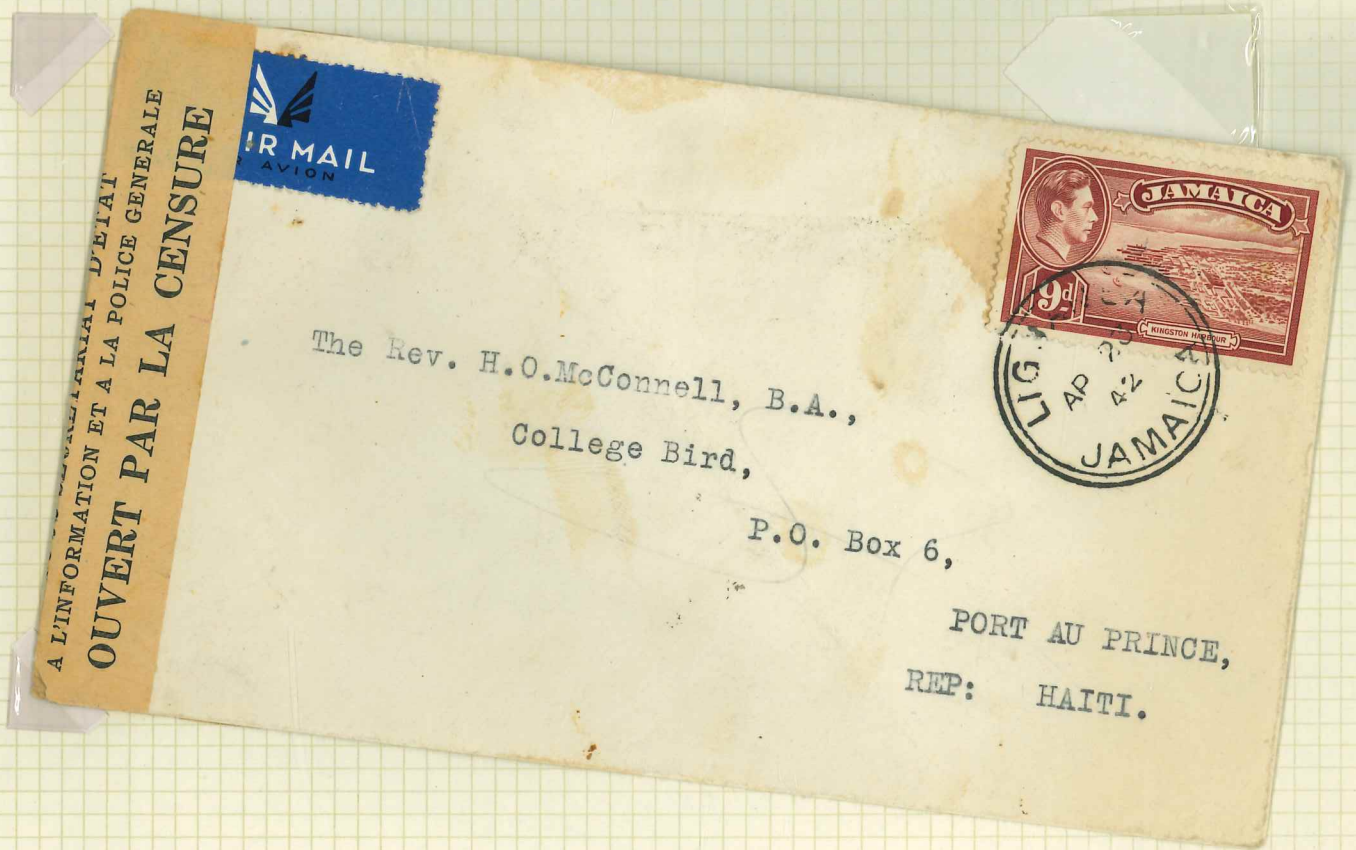
Haitian censor label on the right.

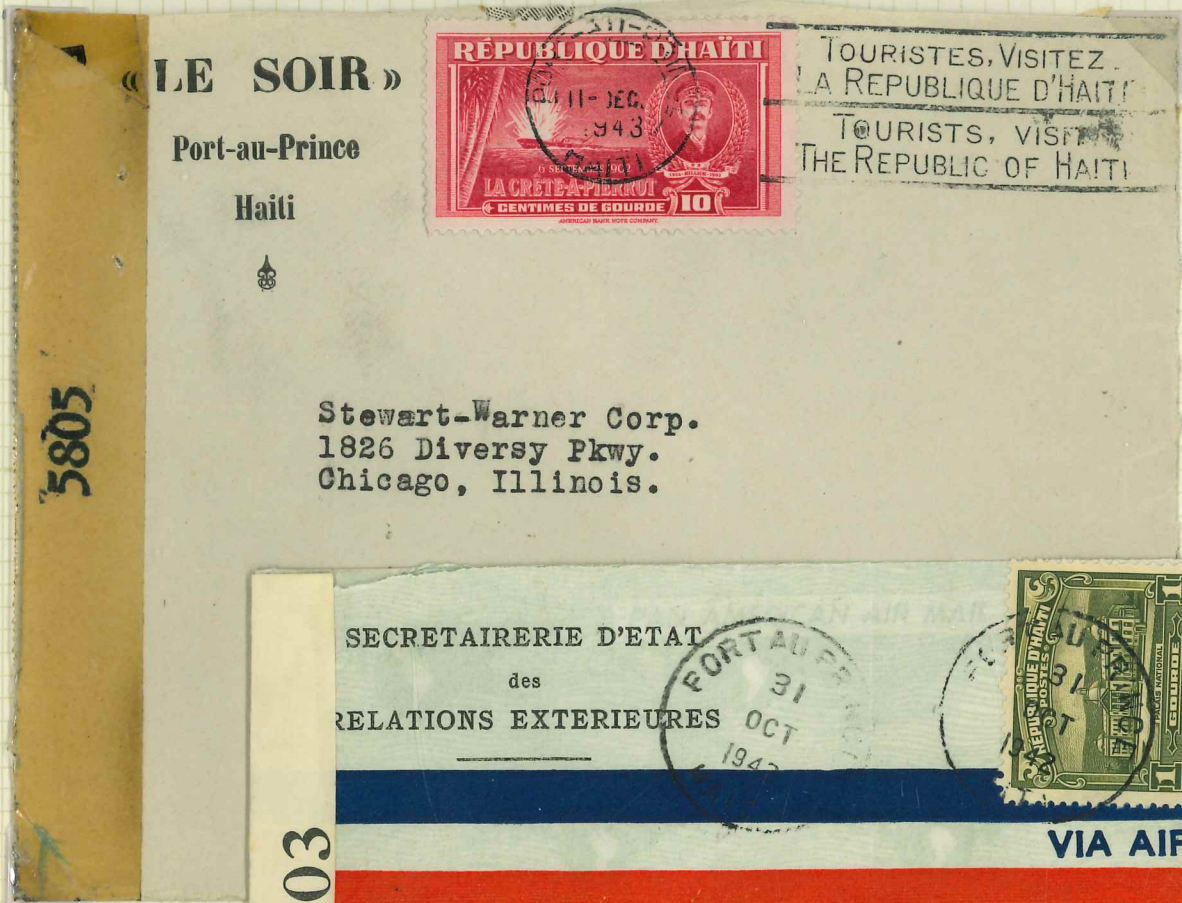
Incoming was also liable for censorship as shown by this letter dated 23 April 1942 from Jamaica. Not censored on departure. Haitian censor's resealing label on the left, tied on the with the cachet of Secretoirerie d'Etat des Relations Exterieurs in magenta and a Port-au-Prince cds. of 25th.

WARTIME CENSORSHIP: 1942 & 43.

Two wartime covers from Haiti, both NOT censored on despatch. The first by sea in December 1943 to U.S.A., the other by air in October 1942 to Canada. Both censored on arrival.



Note: Bi-lingual slogan in use with the c.d.s.

WARTIME CENSORSHIP.

Wartime AIRMAIL to London, posted Port au Prince 24 May 1943 and backstamped in New York on 2 Apr. No arrival marks. Haitian censor at left, US and UK labels on the right.

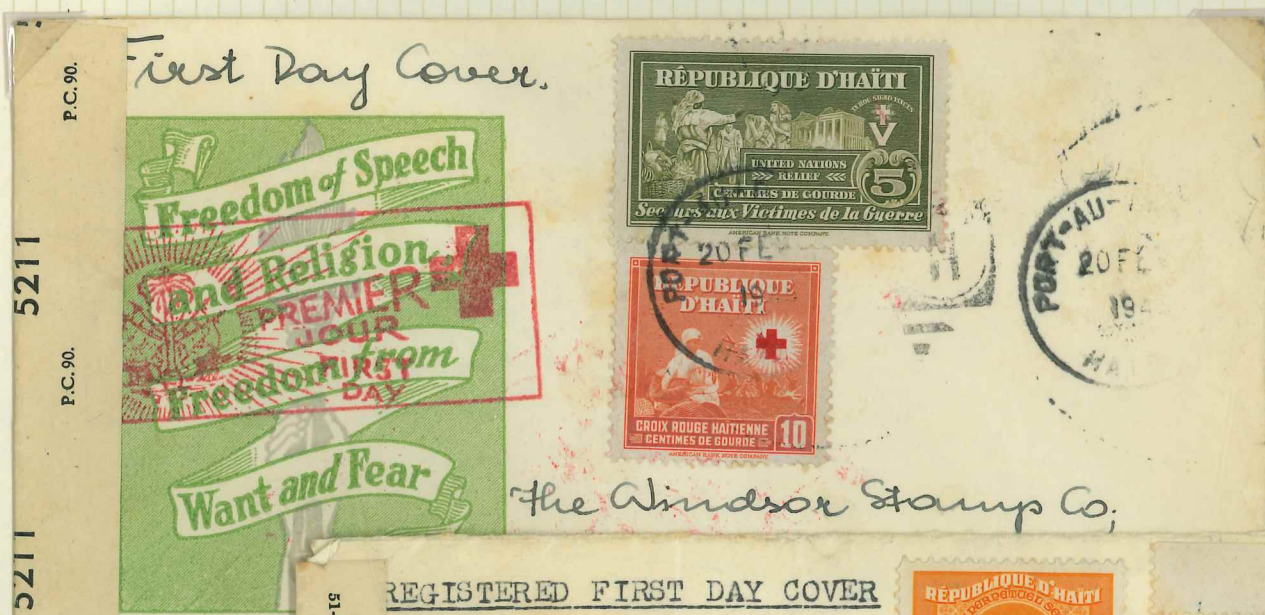

WARTIME CENSORSHIP: 1944 & 45.

Even First Day Covers were censored! These two covers have the Haitian Censor's rubber handstamp on the back and the GB PC90 label on the left.

Red Cross FDC (plus one UN issue) dated 20 February 1945 at Port-au-Prince.



The Windsor Stamp Co.



Registered at Kenscoff with one 10c. value on back, Dated 20 July 1944 NOT 24th. Transit in New York and arrival on 23 September - markings on back.

CENSORED MAIL

AIR MAIL TO ENGLAND

Censored cover with stamps for 1.25g and obligatory tax stamp of 0.5c all cancelled in Port-au-Prince on 2 December 1944. On the left is the Haitian censor's sealing strip and cachet in red; re-examined on arrival in U.K. and resealed on the right. No backstamp to indicate delivery time or route. Probably to New York then across the Atlantic via Lisbon or direct to an airfield in West England.

WARTIME CENSORSHIP: 1945

AIRMAIL to U.S.A., postage 65c. Stamps cancelled with single ring (28mm diam) c.d.s. of Port-au-Prince dated 8 August 1945. No backstamp on arrival.

Evidence that mail was still being censored after the end of hostilities in Europe and within days of the end of the war with Japan. Censored only in Haiti and NOT again on arrival.

WARTIME CENSORSHIP: 1945.

Airmail to U.S.A. with various stamps for 65c rate cancelled with Port-au-Prince single ring c.d.s. dated 25 June 1945. No arrival markings.

Haitian censor label on right overstamped with cachet of the Secrétaire d'Etat des Relations Extérieures. U.S. censor label - Examiner 3129 - on left.
