Special Postmarks on Newspapers, Circulars, and other Printed Matter.

Examples of Pre-cancellation, Fig. 620, page 164, of second impression of "British Postmarks", by R.C. Alcock and F.C. Holland.

Extract from Page 160 of the book mentioned:-

"For pre-cancelling the wrappers of certain large newspapers newspaper distributing agents the Fig. 620 type was introduced in the 1870s, and varieties exist from then until the present time. Permission for a private firm to use a special mark on its pre-cancelled wrappers and take its mail direct to the station was granted as early as 1865....."

Extract from "British Post Office Numbers" by G. Brumell:-

"All these privately used obliterations were, I believe, used as pre-cancels, the wrappers being stamped before being put round the papers directly they were ready, so that no time was lost in despatching them."

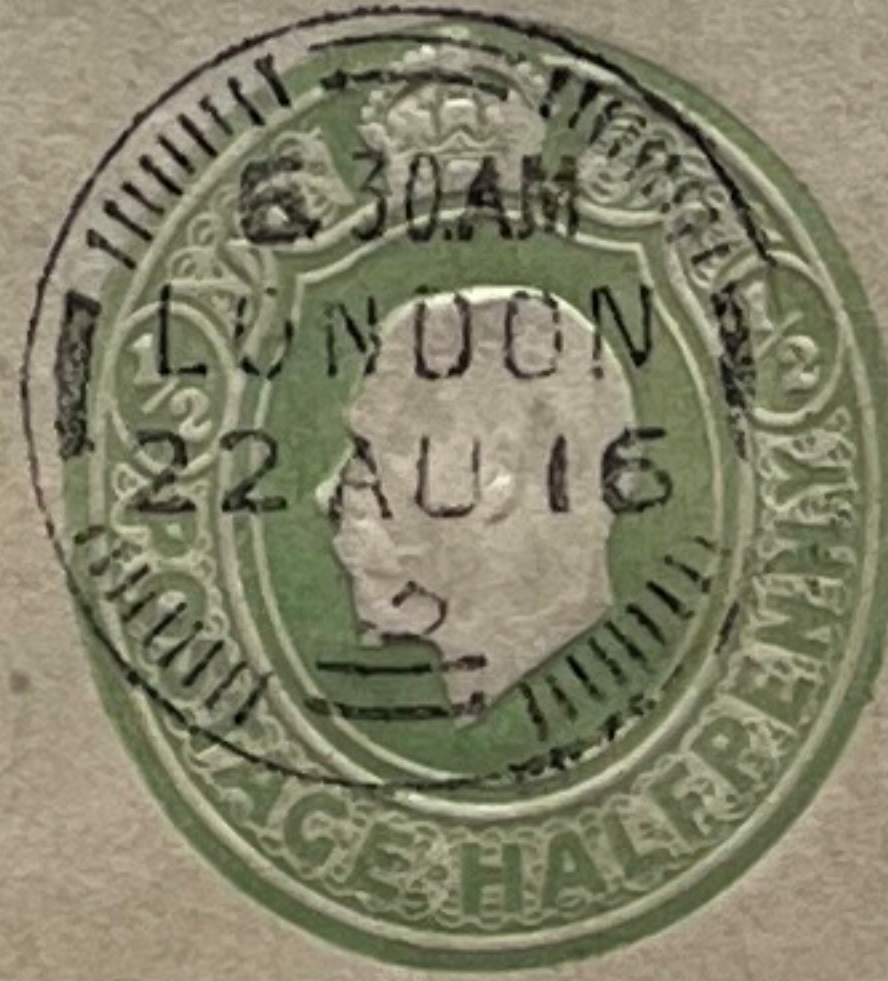

The obliterations for the Newspaper Branch in London, Edinburgh and Glasgow are well known and for the most part reasonably common and obtainable.

In the experience of the writer this is certainly not the case for the Dublin N.P.B. Fred Dixon, the specialist in Irish postal history, discovered the evidence of the existence of a series of 186-in-diamond handstamps with a small 1 to 9 inserted in the upper portion of the design, used at the Dublin N.P.B. Figure 1 is a sketch indicating the format of these obliterations.

Figures 2 and 3 show examples used on the United Service Gazette for 1877 cancelling 1870 1/2d stamps and showing the numbers 2 and 4.

Later the duty of these handstamps was changed and they can be found on registered mail.

They form an interesting postmark variety to look out for and it would be a nice research item to hear from readers who have examples of these to assess their true scarcity.

Stamped paper

1820, March 18

Newspapers printed on stamped paper could be sent throughout the United Kingdom free of postage for fifteen days from the date of publication. The postal validity of the newspaper stamp did not arise until 1831 when the Clerks of the Roads were abolished. They had the monopoly of the newspaper distribution, applying their franking powers. The Post Office Directory of 1832 confirmed this free frank privilege for stamped newspapers.



The stamp paper above was used between 1820 and 1832. Many varieties exist in the design of the 1800 dies and 72 plates for this issue. *The Irish Farmers' Journal* was one of the hundreds of Irish newspapers subject to the newspaper stamp laws in effect from March 15, 1774 to its disappearance when the 1870 Post Office Act introduced a ½d. post paid rate.

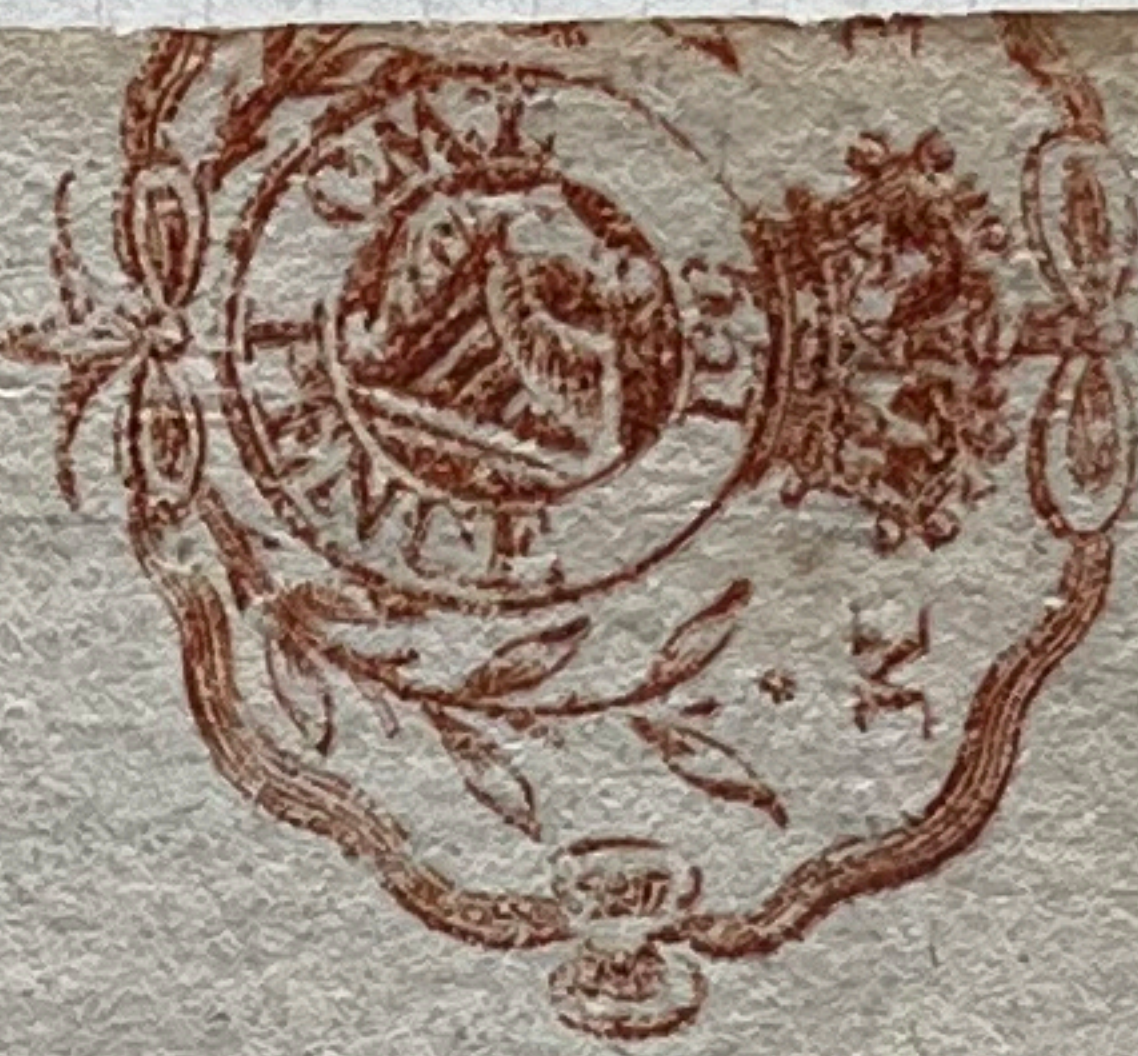

The last of the 19th Century duplexes, the newspaper branch's duplex was introduced in 1873 and is last reported used in 1901. Six handstamps are known: N1 to N6.

Concurrently a numeral-in-numeral handstamp was also available for use in smaller offices. Eight are recorded used between the mid-seventies to 1889. Number 5 & 6 are identified for Lower Mount Street and 8 for Merrion Row. 1 to 4 remain unidentified as yet but one or more of them should be for the College Green office.

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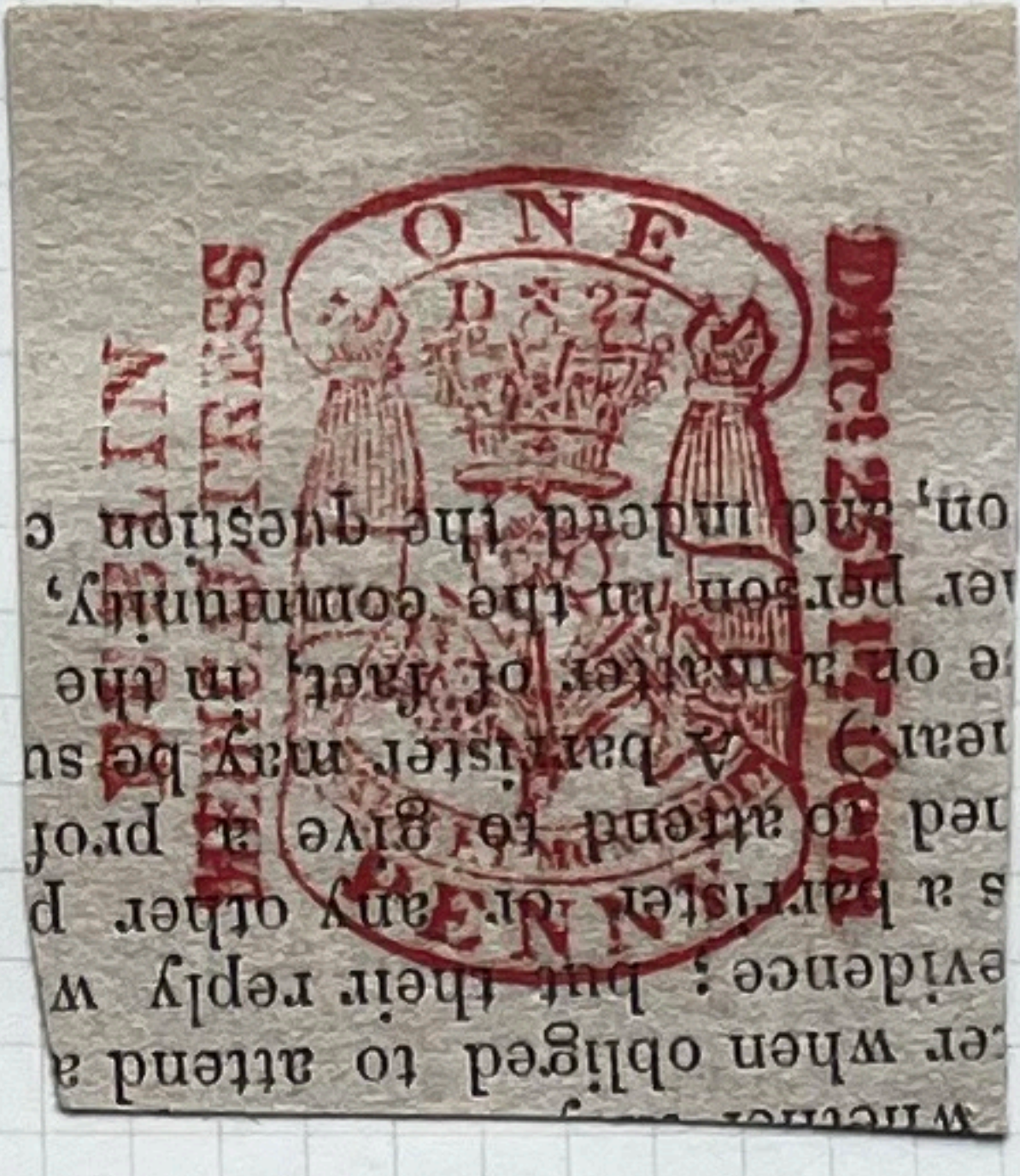
proportion to the diameter of the axle. If two cars were
tried against each other, and for the sake of shewing the
experiment more conclusively, with axles two or three
inches in diameter, the axle of the one being moveable,
of the other fixed—it is easily demonstratable that, *ceteris*
paribus, the car with the moveable axle would have a
decided superiority; but this advantage is lost to the
common car, by its line of draught forming an angle of
about 30° with the horizon, whereas that of the jaunting
car seldom, I believe, exceeds 15°, and of all other car-
riages is considerably less.—In Experiment VI. this will
be again adverted to.

Experiment II. III. IV. VII.—Although it is far from
my intention to deny that springs to carriages possess
some important advantages, I can by no means allow Mr.
Richardson that they have the *smallest effect* in "*lessening*
their draught." Though a horse should undergo much
more fatigue in drawing a carriage without springs, than
one to which they were attached, still this will not prove
that the springs lessened the draught, nor will it at all
assist us to "ascertain the precise weight of additional
loading" which the springs are supposed to enable the
horse to draw, which is certainly the great *desideratum*.
To lessen the draught is for instance, to give one pound
a power of drawing two. By the pulley, the lever, the
screw, &c. this can be effected; but until I see the same
accomplished by the spring, I must reject it as a mechan-
ical power, and cannot therefore consider it among the
most essential principles in the construction of carriages.
Springs, by their reaction, prevent in a great measure, that
continual undulation of the shafts, which is observable in

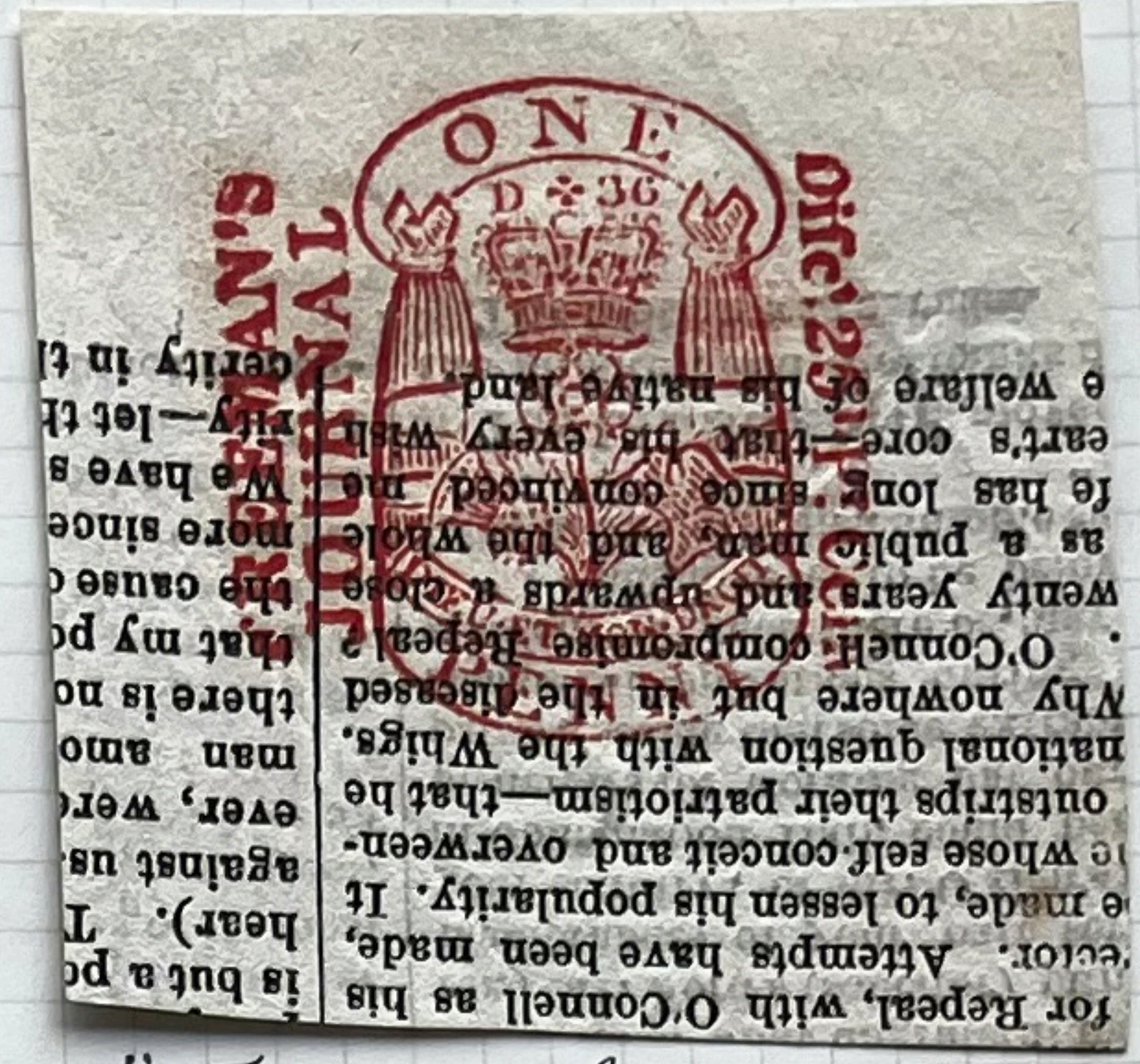

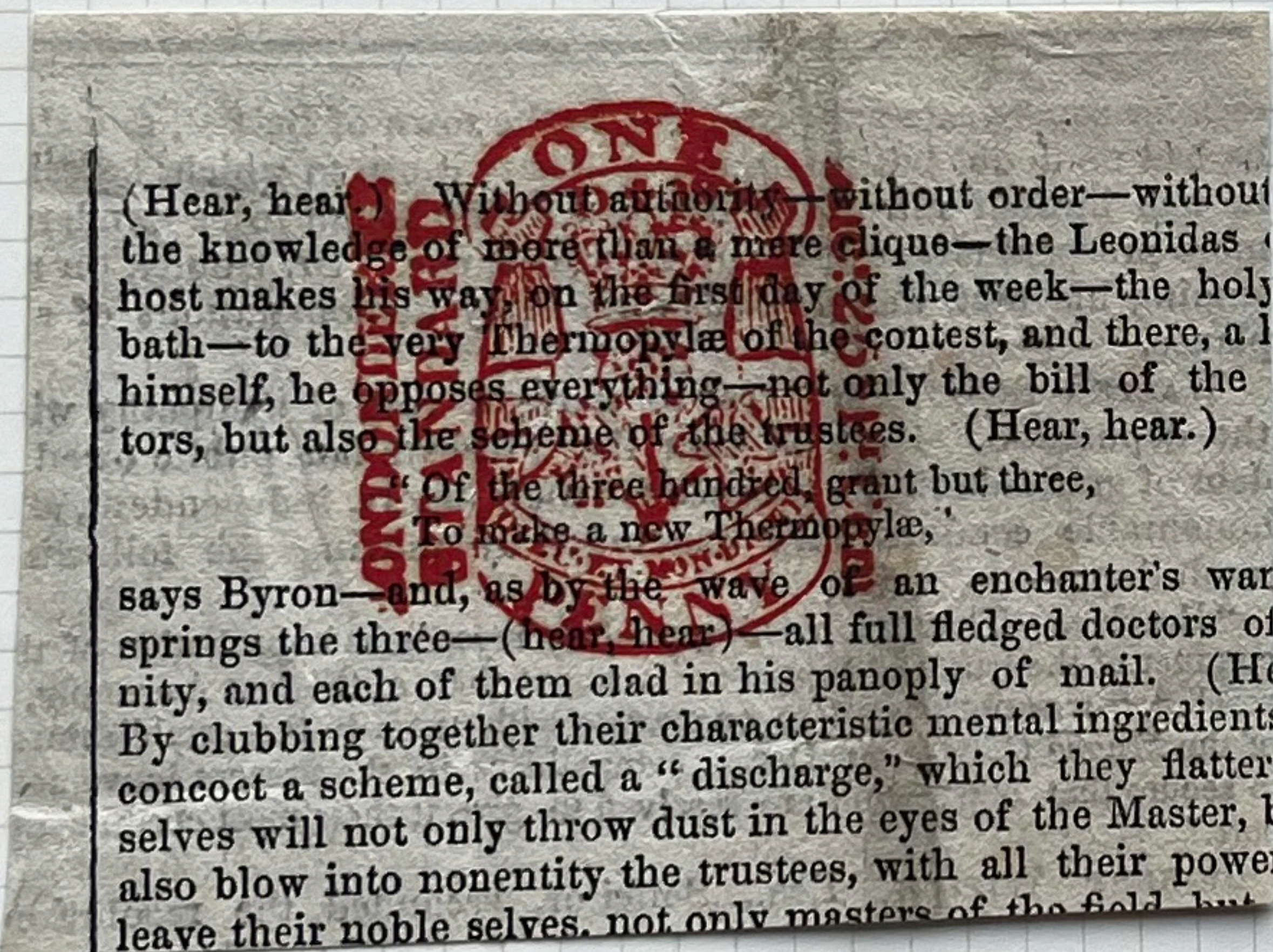

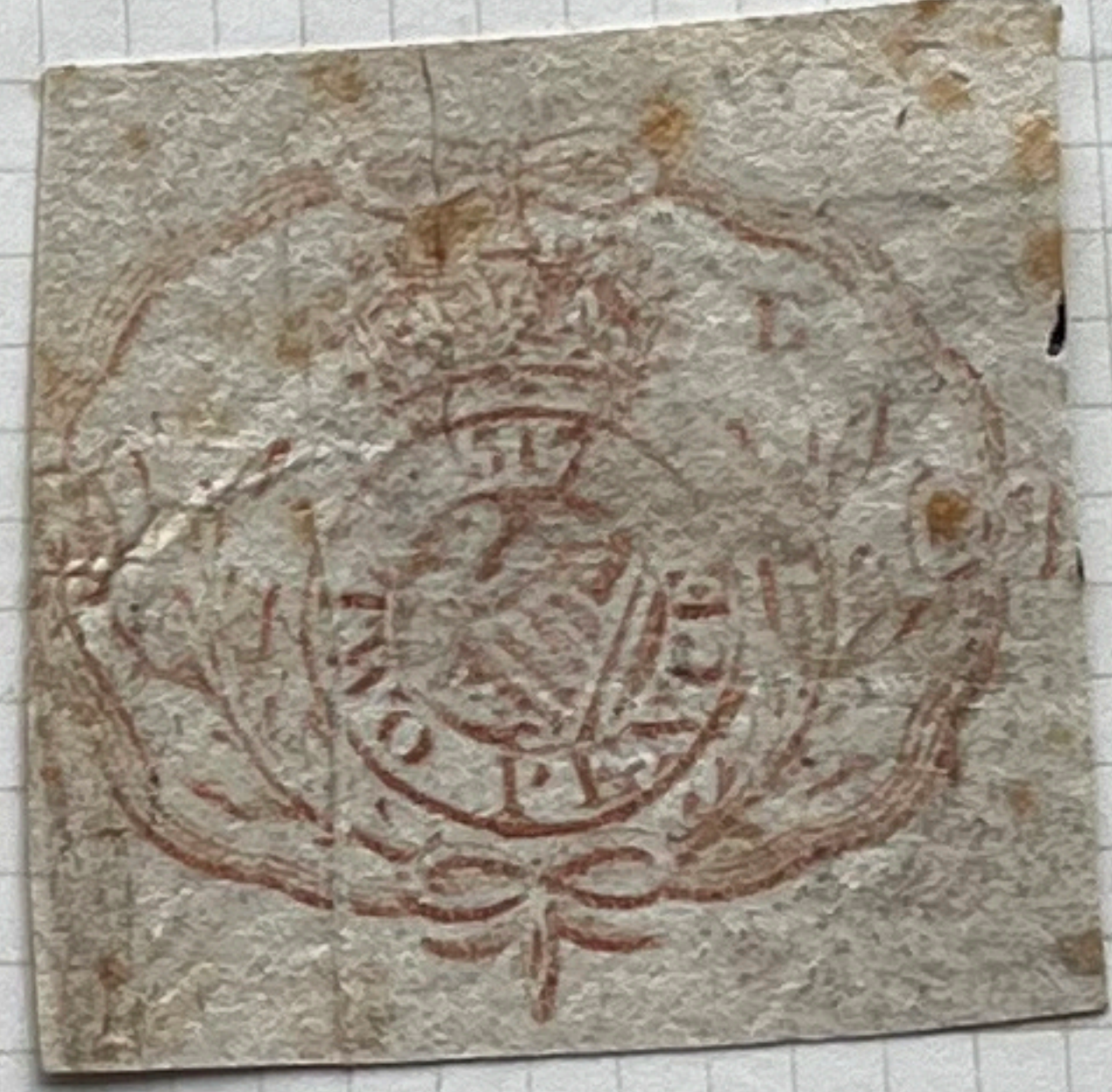
Irish Newspaper Stamps

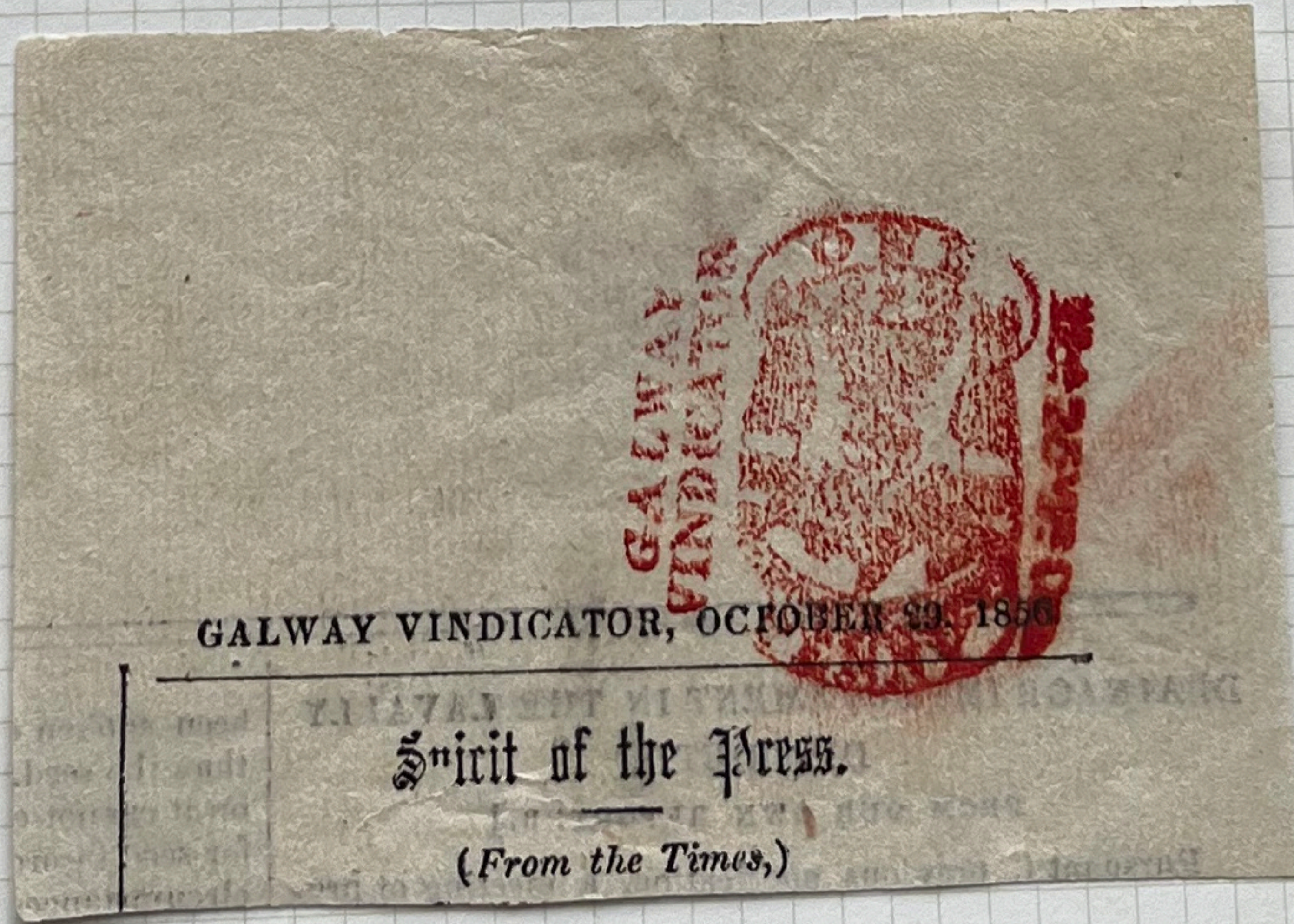

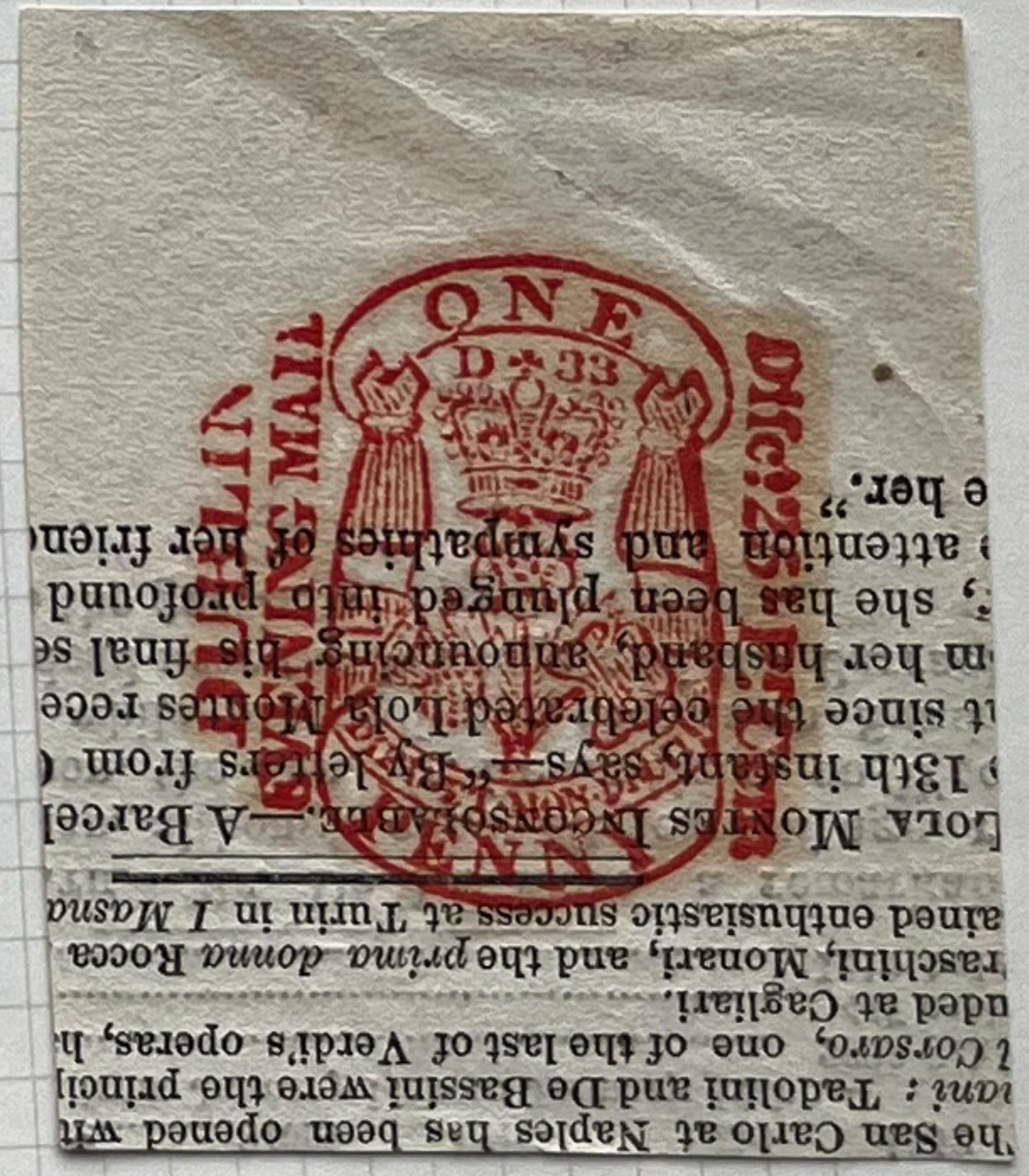
